As our fiscal year ended on June 30, 2022, plans were already underway for the full restoration of parish life as we assessed the needs of the faithful while prioritizing the physical well-being of our parishioners and the community-at-large.

Please know of our constant and continued prayers for all of you throughout this entire pandemic. We pray each day for all of you at morning mass and during our evening prayers.

Thank you for continuing to serve the Lord and Our Lady of Joy by your tireless support, your presence and worship-offering. I am grateful for each of you and the generous support you have given the parish and myself, as well as Father Clement and Father Kurt, who recently began a new position at our diocere. May the Holy Spirit guide me, and may God bless each of you and your families. Please continue to pray for me.

FAITH FORMATION

The Faith Formation Department hoped that July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022 would be a time for the program to return full-force in the wake of a global pandemic, but new challenges surprised us all. Despite the unforeseen tests, the volunteers and staff of the parish rose to overcome them.

We began the year with tremendous promise for children's catechesis and family ministry. Anna Dice was entering her second year as Coordinator of Children's Catechesis and her first with everyone back in the classrooms. Easing back to in-person programming, classes were limited to twice monthly and volunteers returned to teach our youngest parishioners. Dinners were provided as an opportunity for families of the parish with children of similar age to build relationships. Speakers tackled topics relevant to today's parent, and family adoration took place at every other class session.

The program was impacted when Anna had to depart unexpectedly, but the program volunteers forged ahead with several staff members graciously staying late and helping with whatever was needed. Sr. Susan Marie took on several additional responsibilities as Interim Coordinator, and as a result, the children continued to be taught the Faith without interruption. The Sacraments fittingly took place on Pentecost Sunday and were celebrated by Bishop Thomas Olmsted at his last parish visit before retirement. A true blessing for our parish.

Also joining the parish staff amid the challenges of the pandemic was our Coordinator of Youth Ministries, Mady Mooradian. In this, her first year under normal circumstances, Life Teen High School Ministry and Edge Middle School Ministry both returned to regular meetings on Sunday night and Wednesday night, respectively. Both programs started a bit small as families became more comfortable with public gatherings and momentum had to be regained with high-quality programming and consistency.

Continuing the theme, the Rite of Christian Initiation returned to Wednesday nights, now taking place in the Parish Library. David Lins and a curated volunteer team of three led those wishing to become Catholic, those wishing to complete their sacraments of initiation, and anyone who wanted to "audit" the class, in lessons leading all the way from the existence of God to the Creed. The year ended several weeks after many of the participants received sacraments at the Easter Vigil with a party hosted by Fr. Jess in the rectory.

Every adult Faith Formation class returned fully to the Church campus with the exception of the virtual Saturday morning Bible Study. Parishioners were thrilled to finally be able to fully take advantage of the Parish Hall remodel almost every day of the week.

I am proud of the way our parishioners, staff, clergy, and volunteers went above and beyond to ensure that Faith Formation remained a central force at Our Lady of Joy despite the many challenges.







PRESCHOOL

Our Lady of Joy Preschool, located on the south side of our campus behind the church and parish hall, has been teaching children since 1991. Our preschool teaches children ages 3-5 years old in a faith-filled academic setting featuring small class sizes and excellent teachers. We have two preschool classes and two PreK classes that have approximately 8-10 students in each class. The 2020-2021 school year presented unique challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic and our school community worked as a team to create the safest and best early childhood learning environment for our children.

All Catholic schools were closed by the diocese because of the pandemic in March 2020 and although we did not have virtual learning or physical classes, our school community communicated through emails and our social media platforms. Bishop Olmsted passionately communicated to our Catholic school families that the pandemic offered a time to grow stronger as Catholic families and focus our Catholic faith. Throughout the summer months of July and June 2020, our staff and teachers planned for a reopening of the preschool in August 2020. Our plan to keep students and staff healthy and safe was successful, resulting in no reports of teachers or students with the virus during the 2020-2021 school year.

The success of the 2020-2021 school year was the result of a team effort where our preschool families and staff worked hand in hand to keep our school healthy. Our staff wore masks, created pods for the classrooms and increased cleaning practices, to name a few of the strategies employed. After each recess, the outdoor playground, tricycles and balls were sterilized, and a top of the line electrostatic machine was used to clean the classrooms each evening. Our treasured preschool annual events such as Trunk or Treat and Breakfast with St. Nick were cancelled and instead were celebrated in the classroom with the students. Additionally, each classroom had separate arrival and dismissal doors that saved parents time and reduced traffic in the school parking lot - something that we still incorporate into our daily procedures. The 2020-2021 school year was certainly unique and our preschool community grew stronger in our efforts to keep our children healthy and safe during the pandemic. We are grateful for the support of Father Jess Ty, Bishop Olmsted and the Catholic Schools Office during this time.






The OLOJ Instagram and Facebook accounts are used for evangelization to our parishioners and community.

YOUTH MINISTRY

LIFE TEEN & EDGE FALL 2021

Life Teen and Edge began the Fall semester of 2021 with kickoff events. Life Teen set up inflatable games in the Parish Hall and 20 teens attended. Edge played "Family Feud" with 14 students in attendance. The semester included nights of different forms of spirituality (Ignatian, Augustinian, Thomistic, and Franciscan), divine mercy, and gender identity. Each week varied with youth participants but stayed within the 10-17 persons range. The highlight of the semester was a Vocations Panel for Life Teen, where we invited people living out different vocations to come and talk to Life Teen. In attendance were: Katherine and Andrew Lahera, Fr. Kurt, Br. Scott Slatum, Kimberly Zeeman, and Sr. Susan Marie.

In November, 11 teens and 3 Core Members went up north to Tonto Rim Camp for a weekend retreat. The theme of this retreat was vocation and how teens can start praying for their vocation in high school. This 3-day retreat went very well and one of the teens said they had never considered any other vocation besides marriage, but now was more open to praying about religious life and consecrated single life.

After Christmas break, Life Teen and Edge held their kick off events in January of 2022. The Life Teen event was a "Minute to Win It" style game night and had 13 teens attend. The Edge event was based off the popular phone app, "Among Us" and also had about 13 students attend. Each weekly meeting ranged from 10-15 students for both Life Teen and Edge. In April, we conducted Synod meetings for both Life Teen and Edge, as Pope Francis asked. Some of the greatest joys the youth experience in the church revolve around community at Life Teen and Edge and going on retreats.

This semester included nights of Eucharistic Adoration, dodge ball outdoor nights, a night on the importance of Mary's fiat, and how to address mental health issues. On Thursday afternoons Mady and a Core Team member attended lunch at Notre Dame Preparatory where they led a Bible Study for both lunch periods with Fr. Kurt. These lunches have proven to be a successful evangelization outreach that promotes a bond between the parish and the high school. We ended the semester with bowling for Life Teen and a game night for Edge.





YOUTH MINISTRY



In July, Our Lady of Joy took 10 high school students, two priests, and three Core Team members to the Steubenville West Conference in Tucson. This 3-day retreat was filled with talks from Catholic speakers, music, Eucharistic Adoration, Mass, and community. All of the teens expressed gratitude for this opportunity to grow in their faith lives.

We're so thankful for all the youth and parents who are involved in our youth ministry programming and are excited to grow closer to God and in community in the time to come!

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL

Poverty never takes a vacation. That is why at the Our Lady of Joy Conference of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul we are on-call every day of the year. We carry on our work through the donations of our very generous parishioners, which was even greater this year as evidenced by increased monetary, food, and clothing donations.

In order to be the most effective and preserve every person's dignity we keep our financial assistance confidential. We help pay utility bills during the hot summers when some of our local families can't afford the extra expense. We help with unexpected medical and dental bills that have gotten to be a burden on people living on a fixed income. We help with car repairs and replacing tires to help people who have no financial means to get these things and are dependent on them for transportation to and from work. Sometimes they just need a full tank of gas at the end of their month and their money. Sometimes, people find themselves in a situation where they can't pay their rent for a month or two, usually when they are temporarily out of a job. We pay rents! We have a special food drive the Tuesday before Thanksgiving. We call it Turkey Tuesday. This is a whole community project in which St. Vincent De Paul Conferences in the greater Metropolitan area participate. We try to make sure that every family has a turkey

for the holiday. Throughout the year, we conduct food drives and clothes drives to help those in need. We have a back to school project for needy students from ages 5 through 18. We give each child a back pack, two gift cards for Walmart for school supplies and a voucher for the St. Vincent DePaul Thrift Store for clothes. Finally, we contribute to the Phoenix St. Vincent de Paul community through aid to conferences (with needs greater than parish donations), the "Ministry of the Homeless" (homeless food and living assistance), the "Bring Hope Home Ministry" (assistance in relocating homeless to apartment living), and "One at a Time" (tuition assistance for first time in family college students).

Our Founder, Frederic Ozanam stated, "No act of charity is foreign to our society." We abide by this whole-heartedly and do a variety of things to help our people get back on their feet and back in a good place in their lives. But we are so much more than a charity. We are "Christ- bearers" to people who have financial needs beyond their ability to pay. We bear the love, light and message of our Lord and Savior to the people we serve. We pray with them, encourage them and many times leave them with a Bible or a rosary or other religious objects as well as being understanding hearts, feeding hands and friends of the poor financially.




